A-LEVEL POLITICS

WHY STUDY POLITICS AT A-LEVEL?

Should the voting age be lowered to 16? Is the Prime Minister too powerful or too weak? Has politics in the UK and USA become too polarised? What has been the effect of Brexit? Why is turnout at elections declining? Politics is at the heart of everything we do, it is inspiring, exciting and relevant. You will learn to identify political arguments, weigh evidence against opinion and appreciate why politics matters.

TOPICS STUDIED

In the first year of this Edexcel course, you will study how democracy works in the UK. Answering big questions such as: Is it really democratic to have a government which won less than 50% of the votes? How could democracy work better – should the voting age be lowered? What do the different political parties stand for? How does government work? How well are your rights protected? In the second year, you will complete a comparative unit between the UK and the American political system – what is the constitution? Why is it impossible to ban ownership of guns? How is the President elected? Why did Donald Trump refuse to accept the election result?

There are three exams, each is two hours long and they are equally weighted. The questions will require students to write essays, some of which draw upon source materials.
